Join the conversation

The themes for the Artstate Tamworth speakers program are *On Country - In Country:* Respect for Country that deepens knowledge of arts, culture and regional practice and *Arts in the Age of Uncertainty - How the arts address the big issues of our day.*

Artstate 2019 is situated in a third regional landscape, the city of Tamworth in North Western NSW, a region that has been hugely impacted by the current drought and in which the conversation about Country and Uncertainty resonates strongly. Delegates at Artstate 2019 will experience a different regional NSW environment from Artstate 2017 held in the lush hinterland of the North Coast or Artstate 2018 set against the backdrop of Bathurst's cooler climate, rolling hills and colonial architecture.

In developing the 2019 Artstate themes Regional Arts NSW referenced the rapporteurs' report from Artstate Bathurst. From Charles Sturt University, Christopher Orchard, Sub-Dean, Academic in the Faculty of Arts and Education and Dr Travis Bell, Course Director, Communications and Creative Industries, summarised their response to Artstate Bathurst through five strands, Deep Knowledge, Reciprocity, Co-creation, Diversity and Uncertainty.

Thinking about Deep Knowledge, Reciprocity and the opening provocation by Wiradjuri artist, Jonathon Jones in Bathurst, the rapporteurs noted, "If we are going to be serious about arts-citizenship then Artstate must maintain the priority to engage with First Nations peoples and Aboriginal arts practitioners and organizations and continue to provide platform to elevate First Nation knowledge". On Country – In Country will continue to explore this notion.

The theme for the second day, *Arts in the Age of Uncertainty*, collapses the report's final three points into one overarching theme that will examine the current issues affecting arts practice in regional areas. Environmental, social and economic challenges are faced by communities everywhere. They are global issues. Think Trump, Brexit, Hong Kong protests, trade wars, Amazon rainforests burning - the news feeds scream uncertainty daily. They are also regional issues. How do our artists respond? Can they make a difference? Are there more opportunities for artists who work across sectors? How much is cross sector work recognised and valued?

Join us in Tamworth to continue the conversation with an exciting line up of international, national and local presenters providing inspirational and high level thinking around the arts in regional areas and demonstrating the reality of regional excellence.

Keynote 1: Aboriginal Peoples cultural values and perspectives of rivers and groundwater in a modern context.

Australia is the driest inhabited continent on Earth yet is has been the traditional lands of its original inhabitants Australia's First Peoples (Aboriginal People) since the Dreaming or at least thousands of generations. Protecting water landscapes (surface and ground water) has always been a high priority for survival in a dry landscape, and protecting water remains a cultural obligation. The challenge for Aboriginal People is to ensure their value and relationship with water is not diminished or excluded by modern day water management. Aboriginal People acquire the right wisdom and generational traditional knowledge, and many indicate that their worldview is seeing water as inseparable from the land and the sky, bound by traditional lore and customs for its protection. For Australia's First Peoples, occupying an ever drying landscape, traditional knowledge of finding, re-finding and protecting water sites has been integral to their survival for so long. This presentation will explore relationships between Aboriginal People and water and how integrating our perspectives, models and methodologies can influence water management

Brad Moggridge is a proud Murri from the Kamilaroi Nation (North-West NSW). To support his PhD with a young family, he is the Special Advisor First Peoples Water with Water Stewardship Australia (WSA) and part-time Indigenous Liaison Officer for Threatened Species Recovery Hub as a part of National Environmental Science Program (NESP), which allows him to engage researchers and Aboriginal communities aiming to protect threatened species through research.

Key Note 4: Nothing Is Certain But Death and Taxes

WildWorks have been creating site specific work in and with communities on the edge for over a decade. Communities on the edge of conflict, social change and loss of major industry, or rural isolation and economic deprivation. From the West Bank in Palestine, Sunderland in the north east of the UK, to villages at home in Cornwall; these communities are at the sharp end of local, national and global uncertainty. Then 4 years ago WildWorks Founding and Artistic Director received a terminal cancer diagnosis and the company began its own journey of uncertainty, where the only thing that was certain was that it was all about to change. How can personal experiences inform how artists and arts organisations approach uncertainty at a larger scale?
